- 1. Call to order by President Anastasia Mann at 6:07 pm.

- 3. **Approval of April 20, 2022, Minutes.** President Anastasia Mann made a motion to approve minutes as submitted, 2nd by Business Chair Oren Katz. The minutes were approved 17-0.
- 4. President's Report (Anastasia Mann)

- d) **Next HHWNC** Board Meeting: June 15, 2022 (last meeting of current fiscal year) The neighborhood council cannot hear any new funding request. Any outstanding funding request we hope to hear from the city clerk.

5. Public Official Reports

NOTE: Officials each allocated 3 minutes to address the Board and Stakeholders; however, no discussion or Q&A will be allowed due enforcement of Brown Act Restrictions. **Contact info is provided for Board Member and Public to contact with questions.**

- a) CD4-Jorge Plascencia (Jorge, plascencia@lacity.org) & Mehmet Berker (Mehmet.berker@lacity.org), Office of Councilmember Nithya Raman. Jorge Plascencia shared that CD4 coordinated a care plus cleanup on Sunset and Martel Ave. They were able to remove hazardous items and place 3 individuals that were living there into interim shelter and housing. TPC is there doing an assessment on how many people they need to move indoors. There was a fire started last week but they're working with LAFD to determine how the fire started and how CD4 can support. CD4 is working with Ethan Weaver to try and finish a care plus clean up of the area and bring it back to it's original condition. Progress is being made. DCA has finally finished the mural on the Odin underpass. This mural will honor the lives lost due to the AIDS epidemic. Mehmet Berker shared that someone has installed some mature trees at Mulholland and Macapa Dr. LADWP has been notified because the trees were installed on their property and their real estate team is taking the lead. The council office will wait until they've made contact with the person responsible. The Barham LADWP mainline project construction is complete. LADWP is now connecting the existing laterals to the new mainline service. There will be a water shutoff for 8 hours later this month. They are working with LADWP on the notification. CD4 will have the LACC team out to trim back some brush new signage in the Outpost community. CD4 has submitted a batch of locations to street maintenance that have been on the list for a while. Mehmet shared that hillside spills or sluffing, BSS street maintenance groups priority is to make the road passable. They understand there is a gap between passable and very nice. If there are questions, please call 311. Mehmet have an update on RV's citywide and on Cahuenga Blvd West. Effective May 15, there is no longer a moratorium on towing during the height of covid. Highest priority for towing will be vehicles blocking traffic lanes, fire hydrants, driveways or peak parking or anti gridlock zones. There is currently a backlog of towing. The challenge is only one lot for oversized vehicles and one company that tows oversized vehicles. Additional enforcement priorities include accumulation of trash, biohazards, inoperable or unregistered vehicles. The council office is staying in touch with DOT during the process to try and get people out of RV's and into housing. Cleaning has been amplified in RV locations to a level between care and care plus and acceptable to sanitation.
- b) LAPD—Hollywood, Captain Raymond (Ray) Valois (<u>30129@lapd.online</u>); Hwd Hills, SLO Ralph Sanchez (<u>30735@lapd.online</u>); Hwd Ent, Officer Brian White (<u>38074@lapd.online</u>); Hwd Flats, SLO Brian Oliver (<u>37349@lapd.online</u>); NoHo, Officer Kurtis Delbar (<u>38887@lapd.online</u>) Sgt

Jules Sohn, LAPD West Bureau Community Relations Director (38156@lapd.online)
Officer Brian White shared that his focus continues to be Hollywood Blvd right now. The focus has been on violent crimes, mostly aggravated assaults and robberies. He's seen a leveling off and maybe even a slight reduction compared to last year. Hoping to continue this trend into the summer. With Summer warm weather and increasing activities we will have to see how this plays out with tourist and nightlife. He also shared that Officer Ralph Sanchez who asked that he pass along that he's working on the Mulholland corridor and Wonderland with some of the school traffic that's happening in this area. There is an art program happening at Hollywood and Highland from 12 – 4 pm. Several of the SLO will be there. There is a PALS, Police Activities Leagues which supports youth programs at the police department. It's a good place to engage with the community.

- c) Neighborhood Prosecutor, Hollywood Division, Ethan Weaver (Ethan.weaver@lacity.org). Ethan shared that he's had some breakthroughs on the Wilcox triangle with funding approval to fence the triangle as they're working to restore it. He's working with CD4to do a cleanup before fencing. The cleaning and fencing has been scheduled for June 2. He has an open case against the individual who allegedly is responsible for this and during negotiations they have agreed to replant the triangle with the same shrubs at his cost. Will not be a cost to the city. Still working on timing due to the number of shrubs to be purchased. He will be scheduling the contractors and get the triangle replanted. Ethan reiterated the comments of CD\$ that RV's will be a DOT issue to remove RV's that are in violation of the law.
- d) LADWP Michael Ventre (michael.ventre@ladwp.com), Senior Public Relations Specialist shared as a result of the drought, new water restrictions have been imposed. He introduced Virginia Wei, Water Resources Group to present on behalf of LADWP. Virginia stated that LADWP was established in 1925 and is the largest municipal utilities in the nations 2nd largest city. They have about 4 million customers. And serve 450 million gallons of drinking water per day. LADWP has a diverse water supply portfolio and also purchases water from the Metropolitan Water District. MWD gets water from the state water project, operates the Colorado River aqueduct. LA aqueduct is operated by the city. The remainder of LADWP's water comes from local sources. January, February and March resulted in record dry conditions. The California snowpack peaked in January and typically peaks in April. As a result of the conditions, MWD approved a resolution for a water shortage emergency in their state water project dependent areas which includes Los Angeles. The resolution established a framework for the emergency water conservation program to reduce water use in communities most affected by the state's current drought. Restrictions will go into effect June 1. Agencies were offered 2 options. Path 2 allowed a monthly water budget which would meet customer demands when customers reduced from 3 days a week watering to two days a week. Dept of Water resources current approach is based on 55 gallons per day, per person. This allocation does not include allocation for critical CII of other uses. In fire hazard zones it's important to follow LAFD guidelines for brush clearance and fire prevention. Currently in level 2 which allows 3 days a week watering and 8 minutes per day. Will be moving to 2 days a week, recommends use of pool covers and washing of vehicles at commercial wash facilities. You can find rebates on the LADWP website. There are penalties for violations.
- e) 5th Supervisorial District Jason Maruca, Deputy (<u>JMaruca@bos.lacounty.gov</u>); Office of Supervisor Kathryn Barger, District 5 (<u>kathryn@bos.lacounty.gov</u>) Jason Maruca shared that on May 3, the Board of Supervisors approved Supervisor Barger's and Solis' motion to implement the Blue Ribbon Commission on Homelessness' recommendations on homelessness.

 Recommendations were based on a six-month review of our homelessness services' and how

they work together. The commission engaged a wide spectrum of stakeholders. The County Department of Health released the third annual mortality rates on homelessness, and it was found that 1988 homeless dies in the county in a single year. This an increase of 56% from last year. The Supervisors feels there should be a clear line of responsibility. The three main aspects. Bring LASA back to it's premeasure H role and direct services away from the organization while they focus on federal funding opportunities and the homelessness count. Create local solutions fund through Measure H which can be utilized to partner with cities to to implement their own homelessness housing and service plans. Create a county department that would be accountable and coordinate with departments that touch homelessness like mental health, public health and social services. The motion didn't special how the department would be created but they are waiting for a report back. The Supervisor annually holds a tribute to veterans and military families. This will happen Saturday May 28 at Arcadia County Park from 10 am to 1 pm. Admission and parking are free.

- f) 3rd Supervisorial District Rachel Sherrell (rsherrell@bos.lacounty.gov), Fernando Morales (fmorales@bos.lacounty.gov), Office of Supervisor Sheila Kuehl. Rachel shared that Covid cases are rising and recommended everyone be mindful as we go into the Memorial Day weekend as we celebrate with family. D.A. Gascon will be holding a townhall on crime in the county. The meeting will be virtual and will be held June 8. This past week the Board of Supervisors approved 532.6 million for our homeless initiative for 2023 fiscal year that will go towards permanent and interim housing as well as direct funding for 88 cities. This past week the supervisors voted to send a five-signature letter to the state of California to codify the right to abortion in the state constitution. Supervisor Kuehl introduced the bill 20 years ago to make abortion legal in California, while in the Senate.
- g) 50th Assembly District-Josh Kurpies (josh.kurpies@asm.ca.gov), Office of Assemblyman Richard Bloom. Josh shared that several members have several bills in the appropriations committee to move forward this year and would need to be out of the appropriations committee by Friday. Assembly Bills must leave the Assembly by May 27 so they can get over to the Senate. On the Senate side they will be focusing on sending Bills to the Assembly. On Friday the 1th the Governor released his revised budget of \$55 billion and is higher that the January estimate. The Governor is proposing an \$18 billion inflation relief package which includes payments to car owners and a temporary reduction in the diesel taxes, utility assistance continued waiver of low income childcare fees and increase funding in drought funding, energy projects and infrastructure projects.
- h) Department of Neighborhood Empowerment, Dina Andrews (dina.andrews@lacity.org). Dina shared that the Board of Neighborhood Commissioners has reconstituted the 2021 power virtual governance hybrid meeting work group. In addition to discussions of piloting hybrid meeting and the NC system with select NC's and has been expanded to include the discussion of NC's return of in person meetings. The work group members were appointed by the Commission and the department from NC board members throughout the NC system. The congress of neighborhoods is on September 24th, and you can submit and workshop proposals. The last day to submit a workshop proposal is June 15. The administrative technical package for the fiscal year for 2023 is now available.
- i) Will & Arial Durant Branch Library, Angie Brzycki (<u>abrzycki@lapl.org</u>). Angi shared the branch has returned to normal hours and open Monday through Thursday until 8 pm. These hours started April 11. Starting in June in person programming will return. The summer reading program will

start June 6th for youth and families. For the month of May the branch will have programming celebrating small businesses, Jewish American History and API months.

Joint Meeting (Transportation, Community, Areas 2-7) held Monday, May 9, 2022: UPDATE/REPORT of issues concerning Hollywood Bowl Leased Event Traffic issues from open discussionwith Stakeholders and Cityand Philharmonic/Bowl Officials. Dear Ms. Strelich:

The Hollywood Hills West Neighborhood Council (HHWNC) is one of the certified neighborhood councils in the City of Los Angeles. This site is located in HHWNC's area.

At a meeting of HHWNC's Board on September 18, 2019, HHWNC's Board passed two motions with regard to Manuel Valencia's proposed project for this site.

Motion #1 - was passed unanimously (18 to 0).

Motion: On September 4, 2019, HHWNC's Parks and Open Space Committee voted to recommend that the Board oppose the proposed project for 3003 N. Runyon Canyon Road in any form because of (i) the proposed project's significant adverse impacts on the wildlife and their habitat, and park-goers, and (ii) the proposed project's failing to comply with the requirements of the Mulholland Scenic Parkway Specific Plan, which was adopted in 1992.

This opposition is supported by historical precedent. The Los Angeles City Planning Commission previously rejected a 10,000 square foot proposed projectfor this site in 1995.

Motion#2 - was passed by a vote of 16 to 3.

Motion: On August 22, 2019, the City's Department of Planning released a draft environmental impact report (DEIR) on a proposed project at this site for public comment up until October 7, 2019.

Manuel Valencia owns the site, which is approximately 4.5 acres of privately owned property inside Runyon Canyon Park. The site includes approximately 3 acres of hillsides and 1.5 acres of a sloped pad.

There is a Lloyd Wright designed house on the site. The existing house is approximately 2,018 square feet. It is known as the Headley/HandleyHouse. The City designated it as Historic Cultural Monument #563

in 1991. Under the proposed project, the Heather/Handley house would remain intact and largely unchanged after some kitchen appliances are removed.

The main thrust of Mr. Valencia's proposed project is to seek approval for, and to construct, a second structure on the site. The DEIR's notice of availability describes his proposalthis way:

"The Project proposes the construction of a multi-level, single family residential structure along the western side of a modified prominent ridge on the Project Site. The proposed building would include a basement, first floor and second floor area tallying 8099 square feet in size not including the basement, which is excluded by the Department of Building and Safety. There would also be an attached four car

garage. The existing historical structure would remain intact and is located on the opposing eastern side of the modified prominent ridge. As part of the Project, the owner is requesting that the existing structure be reclassified as Accessory Dwelling Quarters. Vehicular access to the Project would be provided via a driveway along North Runyon Canyon Drive.

At an HHWNC PLUM Committee meeting on September 5, 2019, and following a presentation from the applicant's representatives and a discussion, the PLUM Committee voted (5 to 1) to recommend to the Board that the Board should adopt the following motion:

HHWNC opposes the proposed project for 3003 N. Runyon Canyon Road as being inappropriate for the site under the Mulholland Scenic Parkway Specific Plan and the Mulholland Design and Preservation Guidelines (collectively, the Mulholland Specific Plan).

Under the Mulholland Specific Plan, the proposed project is far larger than what would be appropriate for the site, too tall (even though some of the proposed project would be buried into the hillside site), too massive and incompatible with the neighborhood.

HHWNC believes that:

- (i) the City should not grant the applicant's request to treat the existing Headley/Handley House, which is Los Angeles' cultural historic monument #563, as "Accessory Living Quarters" in order to permit the construction of a second house on the site.
- (ii) the City should not approve the grading being proposed with this proposed project. The proposed grading involves too much grading to the site, which is a designated prominent ridge under the Mulholland Specific Plan.
- (iii) the City should not approve the applicant's request to build a third retaining wall on the site, which would be needed to hold back much of the grading which the applicant is requesting to do on the site because the City should not be able to find, as required under the Mulholland Specific Plan, that the proposed grading should be kept to a minimum, assure that graded slopes have a natural appearance, and preserve the site's natural topography;
- (iv) the proposed project is not adequately described in the draft environmental impact report (DEIR) for the Planning Department's case no. ENV-2016-4180-EIR and State Clearinghouse no. 2018041016).
- (v) the DEIR doesn't accurately and fairly describe the proposed project and does not analyze the proposed project's likely environmental impacts under the applicable law(s), including the Mulholland Specific Plan.

The DEIR applies an LA Department of Building and Safety practice to exclude basement space from the proposed project's description of the proposed project's square footage. The LADBS practice ignores the clear language in the Mulholland Specific Plan's proposed "Project" definition. The Project definition

includes the space in all structures and any changes in use to land other than interior remodeling. No citation is provided for LADBS efforts in any DEIR to change the applicable laws.

The DEIR ignores the (i) the Mulholland Specific Plan's provision which is more restrictive than (and trumps) the LADBS's application of its understanding of the City's Municipal Code, and (ii) the Mulholland Design Review Board's practice of treating "basement space" which opens to daylight as non-exempt space in proposed projects.

These two errors resulted in the DEIR treating over 5,200 square feet of the proposed project's "basement" as exempt when it is not exempt. The proposed project really seems to be a three-story house and approximately 42' high.

(vi) the proposed options of no build, build smaller, or build on a different part of the site, do not provide sufficient analysis of the facts in this situation or the applicable law(s). For example, while the DEIR states that the proposed project's impact on views from Mulholland Drive will not be significant, the Mulholland Specific Plan provides that a proposed project's impacts in all directions should be considered, rather than just from Mulholland Drive. This proposed project's likely impacts on Runyon Canyon Park and the surrounding neighborhoods would be significant.

(vii) the City should denythe proposed project also because the applicant ignored the Mulholland Design Review Board's recommendation to come back to that advisory board with a proposed house of 5,500 square feet. The proposed project seems to exceed 24,000 square feet. We believe that the proposed project doesn't not comply with the MDRB's recommendation(s) and would be far too large and otherwise inappropriate for this prominent and historic site.

The DEIR states that the City declined to purchase the site in 1992. That seems like an error which should be corrected now —and just like the City purchased Mt. Lee from the Howard Hughes Investment Trust several years ago.

In addition, the City's 1995 decision to deny an application to build a large home on this site seems entirely correct. It was a precedent setting decision which HHWNC asks the City to follow now in 2019 by turning down this proposed project.

4) Please describe the purpose and intent of the grant.

The purpose of the grant is to assist in funding the installation of a sprung dance floor at Yucca Community Center. Currently, the participants in the dance program must dance on a cement floor. The cement floor does not provide adequate support for the dancers to learn all the skills needed in ballet, latin, modern dance, yoga, etc. In order to prevent serious injuries to the participants, our dance instructor is limited to the skills she can instruct. In order to improve and elevate our dance program, and provide more equal opportunities for the children in our programs, the dance floor is a much needed asset to the program and the center.

5) How will this grant be used to primarily support or serve a public purpose and benefit the public at-large. (Grants cannot be used as rewards or prizes for individuals)

Dance programs have been offered at Yucca Community Center since 2006. Participants have learned dance skills in the Yucca dance classes for 16 years. Many of the participants have participated and been taught by Beatriz for numerous years at Yucca for very low cost for the instruction. At this time, we are able to offer most dance classes to children 5 to 15 years old for a \$10 fee. This fee pays for 8 weeks of dance instruction for one hour dance classes once a week. If a family cannot afford to pay the \$10 fee, recreation and parks can provide a scholarship so they can attend for free. This grant will support the programs at Yucca by providing a sprung dance floor that can be used by ballet, karate, yoga, modern dance, latin dance. At this time, the following classes utilize the dance room and floor: latin dance, preballet, ballet 1, ballet 2, ballet 2, ballet technique, modern dance, yoga fitness, 2 karate classes. We have about 100 registrations for the spring session in those particular classes. We are currently limited to 10 participants in each class due to covid protocols. When covid protocols are lifted, we can register more participants in each class. The maximum capacity in the dance room for each class is 20 participants under pre or post covid regulations. More dance classes can be implemented in this dance room
