Meeting Minutes

1. **Call to order by President Anastasia Mann by President, Anastasia Mann at 6:05 pm**
2. **Roll Call by Secretary, Darnell Tyler. Quorum established.**

3. **Approval of June 15, 2022, Minutes. President Anastasia Mann made the motion to approve the minutes as submitted, 2nd by Area 5 Chair Charles Coker. The minutes were approved 17-0.**
4. **President's Report (Anastasia Mann)**

Lt. Wells thanked HHWNC and President Mann for the invitation to introduce himself. She shared that he’s currently on the graveyard shift and will be moving to the midday shift from 10 or 11 am to 8 or 9 pm. He’s been with LAPD for 27 ½ years and has worked in every bureau. This is his first opportunity to work in Hollywood and he’s wanted to work the area his entire career. Lt. Wells stated that he wrote a lot of the policies and can help with the homeless program. He also shared that President Mann has shown him around Mulholland and shares some of the issues. He has already started working on issues associated with the unhoused community.

- e) **WILDLIFE ORDINANCE – LA CITY PLANNING DEPT** – UPDATE based on Community Public Comment & Stakeholder outreach to HHWNC: Comments by President Mann, Parks Chair Jeffrey Masino. Discussion.

Jeffery Masino shared that board members spoke at the Wildlife Ordinance hearing in addition to several organizations and city staff. There was support for the intent of the ordinance and acknowledgement that open space with worth planning and protecting. Homeowners that spoke at the hearing mentioned the disconnect between the ordinance and its application

especially for smaller lots. There were some long-time homeowners that spoke in support of the ordinance. Homeowners wanted more time and clarification as well as more of the science and analysis behind the recommendations.

 Mehmet shared that CD4 has been participating with the Durant Library and project We Hope to provide mobile shower, laundry and bathroom facilities at the library. This pilot has been on going on a bi weekly basis from 10 am to 2:30. CD4 and Hollywood United Methodist Church will be collecting new backpacks and school supplies at the church to help kids going back to school. Items needed are backpacks, No.2 pencils, single subject spiral notebooks, colored pencils and markers. CD4 and LA City Council President, Nury Martinez made a safe haven for abortion motion. The encampment to home program has recently moved 6 more residents. Based on their efforts, project room key site has been extended for an additional two months. Care plus is scheduled for Sunset and Martel and the twice a week care. Barham mainline project is complete, There was another mainline break at Odin. He’s talked with DWP and there may be a mainline project on Cahuenga but he will keep the community updated. The Van Nuys development service center will be offering limited in person meetings for certain things by appointment only beginning on July 25. Check the planning website for more details. Any issues or questions regarding Griffith Park reach out to CD4 office
- b) Neighborhood Prosecutor, Hollywood Division, Ethan Weaver (Ethan.weaver@lacity.org). Ethan Weaver shared that rooftop noise coming from rooftop nightclubs is an issue he’s concerned about, however its not easy to tackle because LAPD doesn’t have the capability to deal with it currently. If stakeholders are dealing with loud noise coming from nightclubs at night, please let his office know. The people being impacted are sometimes miles away but it’s an issue that they need to address. Please provide a specific street that’s being impacted. At the triangle, they are waiting a new electrical box to be installed so they can replant the triangle. Ethan encouraged everyone to show up for National Night Out at Bernstein High. They will have the only all LGBT mariachi band performing. This band has been covered by Smithsonian magazine.

- I. Joint Committee Meeting re: Hollywood Bowl Traffic (Community Chair- Chris Wintrode, Transportation Chair- Kyrstin Munson, Area 3- Brian Dyer).

Update: Community, Traffic and Area 3 Committees met jointly on May 9th, 2022 via ZOOM with 75 Stakeholders and Guests in attendance including Gibson Transportation Consulting and HHWNC board members. Participants posed numerous questions, while sharing experiences from traffic distresses, as well as specific traffic mitigation ideas. The mutual goal was to find paths for immediate relief and longer-term resolution for oppressive transport and environmental conditions directly caused by influx in traffic from Hollywood Bowl events and often overlapping events occurring on the same nights within the area.

The Committee voted to Submit the following motion to the full board for consideration.

Motion: The HHWNC Board supports the Joint Committee request to submit the following six items to the listed recipients regarding the increasingly unfavorable impacts of Hollywood Bowl traffic, particularly from an increased lease event schedule, as discussed at the Joint Committee Meeting, May 9,2022 re: the Hollywood Bowl & Neighborhood Traffic.

Therefore HHWNC calls upon the LA Philharmonic/Hollywood Bowl, CD4, CD13, LADOT, LA County District 3, LA County District 5, to address and resolve the following neighboring community needs as quickly as possible:

1. Emergency vehicles can easily and quickly enter and exit to serve neighborhoods, businesses, & the Hollywood Bowl.
2. Neighbors and businesses can enter and exit their properties without extraordinary delay.
3. Stakeholders have responsive communication channels to provide guidance and feedback on mitigation measures and progress, learn about updates, and community satisfaction regarding traffic mitigation & communication measurably increases over time.
4. Neighborhoods have minimal noise impact from bowl traffic and/or operations.
5. Neighborhoods have drastically reduced carbon emissions from Bowl traffic and operations.
6. Traffic mitigation efforts demonstrate measurable improvements over time by encompassing the latest data research and community input (accounting for variety of Bowl event scenarios).

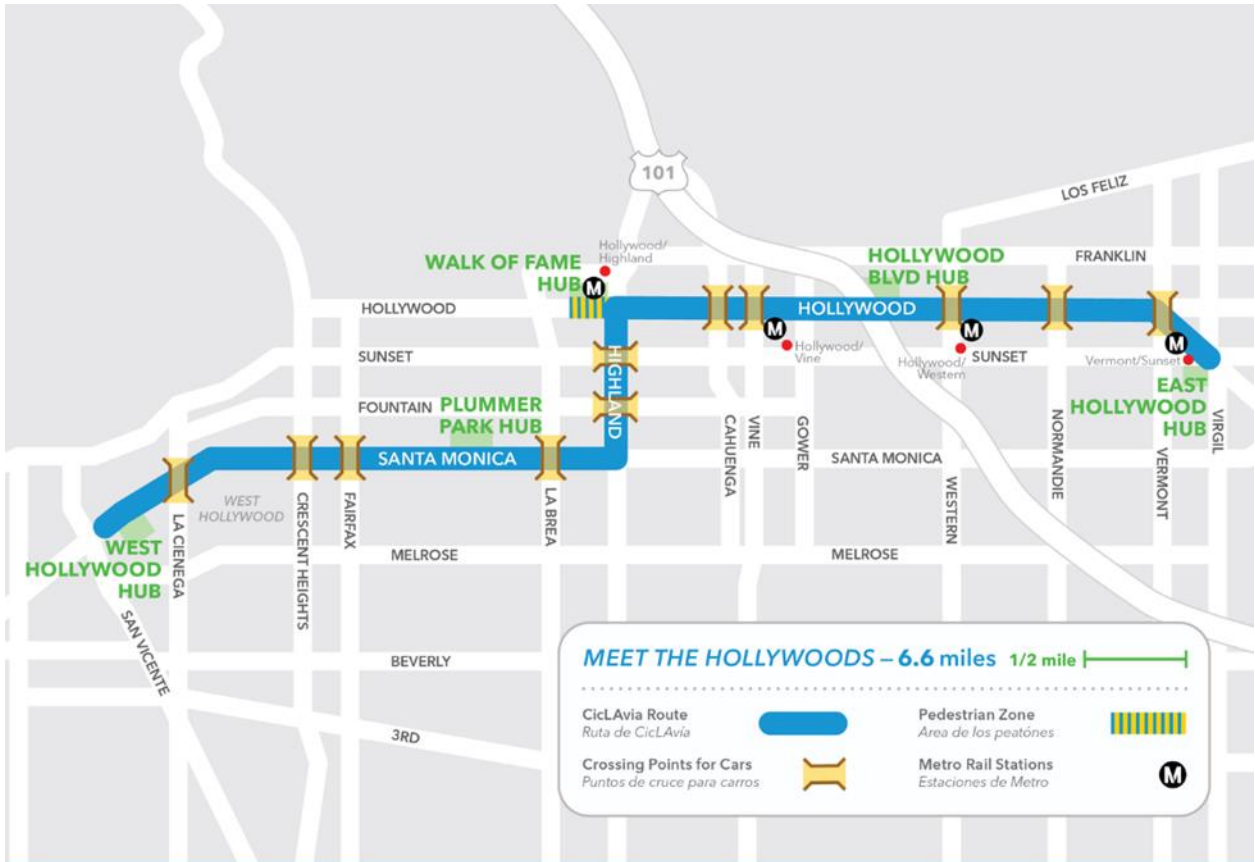

Projects and activities supported by NPGs vary widely and can include, but are not limited to:

- The Arts
- Beautification
- Community Support
- Education
- Community Improvements

NPG-funded projects and activities must be for a **public benefit** and purpose, **open**, **accessible**, and **free of charge** to stakeholders.

Grants approved by NCs exceeding \$5,000 involve further review and possible City contract by the Office of the City Clerk.

There are two NPG Information Packets; One for prospective applicants to help guide them in the application process, and one for NC board members outlining considerations and factors to keep in mind while evaluating NPG requests.

A "Project Completion Report" template is also provided to help ensure accountability in the use of Grant funds and help demonstrate how NCs and their partners are supporting L.A. communities and stakeholders. SECTION II - PROJECT DESCRIPTION

4) Please describe the purpose and intent of the grant.
 The purpose of the grant is to assist in funding the installation of a sprung dance floor at Yucca Community Center. Currently, the participants in the dance program must dance on a cement floor. The cement floor does not provide adequate support for the dancers to learn all the skills needed in ballet, latin, modern dance, yoga, etc. In order to prevent serious injuries to the participants, our dance instructor is limited to the skills she can instruct. In order to improve and elevate our dance program and provide more equal opportunities for the children in our programs, the dance floor is a much needed asset to the program and the center.

5) How will this grant be used to primarily support or serve a public purpose and benefit the public at-large. (Grants cannot be used as rewards or prizes for individuals)
 Dance programs have been offered at Yucca Community Center since 2006. Participants have learned dance skills in the Yucca dance classes for 16 years. Many of the participants have participated and been taught by Beatriz for numerous years at Yucca for very low cost for the instruction. At this time, we are able to offer most dance classes to children 5 to 15 years old for a \$10 fee. This fee pays for 8 weeks of dance instruction for one hour dance classes once a week. If a family cannot afford to pay the \$10 fee, recreation and parks can provide a scholarship so they can attend for free.
