Topic Description: Milner Closure. During heavily attended Hollywood Bowl events, , Milner has a hard closure (no ingress/egress for anyone, including residents). This is to prevent digital way-finding programs from guiding drive through traffic through the neighborhood (please see map of area affected). Many stakeholders have stated that they weren't consulted on the hard closure. HHWNC previously held an online survey to capture Hollywood Bowl traffic issues, including Milner. However, Area 3's participation was split on the Milner issue, with a very low turnout resulting in a 50/50 split. Further outreach was decided to be done.

This motion asks for funds to send a mailer to accurately assess the affected stakeholder's opinion on the closure by inviting them to take a survey online or send it back. Ultimately, it is the City's decision, but outreach has not been effective on this issue. The survey is planned to stay open until end of 2023.

The purpose of this grant is to convert the hillside brush area at Fire Station 76, which is currently a nuisance and liability with semi-annual brush clearance and weeding, into a usable garden sanctuary supporting the growth of fruits, vegetables, herbs and California natives, and offering a community retreat for the surrounding neighbors.

5) How will this grant be used to primarily support or serve a public purpose and benefit the public at-large. (Grants cannot be used as rewards or prizes for individuals)

The new garden will offer a place to harvest organically grown foods, support local ecology, and restore both mental and physical health of the LAFD members located at Fire Station 76. Local volunteers from the HHWNC region and the HUNC along with firefighters at Station 76 will help to plant and redo the terrace in the back area. A patio area with furniture will be moved to provide an area for community members to meet with fire station members to discuss issues and concerns. Harvesting fruit will be a big part of this project and will provide for the community to work together in beautifying the station and its outside environment. Eliminating the lawn in front of the station and replacing with gravel and some agave will assist with the City's environmental green policy, drought tolerant goals, and reduce the fire hazard currently present. 
Appendix to Area 3 Motion for Milner Street Closure Survey

The US Census data American Survey (United States - Census Bureau Profile) estimates that the 2021 count for households in Census Tract 1896 is 1,988. (in comparison, Area 3 currently has However, census tract 1896 also includes the dell. A conservative estimate, since the southern perimeter of census tract 1896 un area 3 is apartment residential, 50% of the household's would be mailed (it should be less, in actuality.) As a point of consideration: this campaign is also outreach. There are currently 209 emails associated in Constant Contact (HHWNC's bulk email service provider). Area 3 is also South of Franklin. Requests for participation and introduction to HHWNC would build our NC's neighborhood reach and introduction to those who are not yet using HHWNC as their neighborhood government resource.

ZIMAS provides a radius mailing label data set. This would be culled appropriately for those affected by Milner, which would be North of Franklin, South of the 101 Freeway, East of Highland and West of Cahuenga.

TRANSPORTATION COMMITTEE PRIORITIES, TOPICS, & UPDATES

2023-2024 Priorities:

The top priorities of the Transportation Committee for 2023-2024 are to continue advocating:

- to implement the <u>short, mid and long term</u> traffic mitigation efforts caused by the Hollywood Bowl outsourced events;
- for safer streets for pedestrians, <u>bicyclists</u> and motor vehicles by improving transportation signage, improving/adding sidewalks, improving/adding bike lanes, adding slow streets; and
- 3. for an increase in transportation demand management programs.

<u>Topics and Updates</u>:

Here are a list of topics and relevant updates that the Transportation Committee is tracking that will be addressed in an upcoming Transportation Committee meeting. Please submit any additional topics or feedback to transportation@hhwnc.org

1. Los Angeles City Service Request (MyLA311) Now Includes Transportation Items

- a. It is super important to use your mobile phone app, computer, or call in to log in items so the city can log and track issues to completion.
- Transportation items are now in the system so things like traffic signal maintenance, traffic signs, curbs, pavement markings, etc. can be reported and tracked.

2. Transportation Committee Website Refresh/Update

The Hollywood Hills West Neighborhood Council Transportation Committee website
will be refreshed to include more timely updates on transportation related topics.

3. Hollywood Bowl operated by Los Angeles Philharmonic Association Traffic

- An <u>advisory group</u> was created with representatives from each neighborhood group around the Bowl.
- A special traffic consulting firm, <u>Infrastrategies</u>, was hired to review the list of short, mid, and long term traffic mitigation efforts that have been identified by stakeholders (<u>see list</u> here).
- c. A major initiative is evaluating the hard/full street closures and working with California State representatives to update legislation to allow for soft/partial street closures instead. A meeting is being organized with Los Angeles Council District 4 (Nithya Raman) and Los Angeles Department of Transportation to discuss the feasibility of implementation if soft/partial street closures were allowed by California State law.

- d. A second survey that focuses on getting additional stakeholder feedback regarding whether the Milner Road hard street closures should continue during busy Bowl events is being planned by the Hollywood Hills West Neighborhood Council Area 3 Chair.
- e. If you haven't already enjoyed a concert at the Bowl, there's still time to redeem the neighborhood vouchers that are provided each year through your local neighborhood association to attend a concert for free.

4. Street Light Outages

- a. The Bureau of Street Lighting provided an update about the increase in copper theft from street lights that is causing an increase of service tickets related to street light outages. The city has a huge backlog of requests. An informative presentation on this topic is located here.
- b. It is important to use your mobile phone app, computer, or call in to <u>MyLA311</u> log in any street light issues so the city can log and track issues to completion.

5. Hollywood Hills West Neighborhood Council Road Repair

- a. There are several roads in the council area that are in dire need of repair, either asphalt or concrete roads. The City has a map that shows what they have recorded as the condition of roads here.
- The Transportation Committee has asked for a list of what Los Angeles City Council District 4 (Nithya Raman) has prioritized for funding repairs.
- c. The known issues reported to the Transportation Committee thus far are:
 - i. Jalmia Drive
 - ii. Outpost Drive
 - iii. Outpost Cove
 - iv. La Presa

6. Tour Bus/Van Traffic and Dangerous Operations

a. Los Angeles Department of Transportation is presenting an update at the September 20, 2023 Hollywood Hills West Neighborhood Council Board meeting on the status of their study and the next steps to pass more rules around Tour Bus/Van operations on neighborhood streets

7. Jerome C. Daniel Overlook above the Hollywood Bowl

- The plastic bollards at this <u>location</u> are broken and need repair and the curb dirt area is being used for illegal parking.
- My311 tickets entered and Los Angeles City Council District 4 (Nithya Raman) office requested to evaluate feasibility of making capital improvements to make this area safer.

8. Universal City Overlook on Mulholland

- Concerns about night parking, parties/noise, speeding/racing, and trash after hours at this location.
- b. Request made to Los Angeles City Council District 4 (Nithya Raman) office to evaluate feasibility of installing a fence that can be closed and locked after hours <u>similar to</u> other parks and overlooks.

9. Mulholland Speeding

- a. Los Angeles Department of Transportation and Los Angeles City Council District 4 (Nithya Raman) office engaged. Study conducted on the feasibility of installing speed bumps on Mulholland to help slow/control speed of vehicles.
- Funding available to install three speed bumps. Raman's office to provide an update on the selected locations before construction begins.

10. Hollywood Boulevard Safety Improvement Project

 Los Angeles Department of Transportation is working on improving safety along a twomile segment of Hollywood Blvd between Gower Street and Lyman Place. Public comment and feedback is requested. b. Read more about it here: https://ladotlivablestreets.org/projects/hollywood-blvd

11. Forest Lawn Drive Active Transportation and Safety Improvements project

- a. This project will reconfigure the roadway to ensure safer traffic operations and will add physical protection for the existing Class II bike lanes. The project bounds are the Warner Brothers gate east to Zoo Drive. Read more about this project here.
- b. Per <u>LADOT's Forest Lawn Drive project fact sheet</u>, the city is currently doing outreach and data collection, intending to finalize the design this fall. Implementation is anticipated next Winter/Spring in coordination with planned street repaying.

12. Hollywood Blvd Closures

- Los Angeles City Council District 13 (Hugo Martinez) leads a monthly meeting to review and evaluate all requests to close Hollywood Boulevard.

13. Healthy Streets Los Angeles

- a. A March 2024 ballot measure will require the City of Los Angeles to implement its <u>Mobility Plan 2035</u> whenever the City repaves or otherwise works on a street. Doing so will save money, reduce traffic, make the streets safer, and give people more options to get around town, helping to clean our air.

14. Speeding Cameras

- a. That California state legislature has introduced <u>Assembly Bill 645</u>, that if approved would allow cities to install cameras in school zones and on city streets where speeding has been a problem. This may be an option for Hollywood Hills West Neighborhood Council streets that frequently have high speeding like Mulholland.

15. Sepulveda Transit Corridor

- a. Metro's Sepulveda Transit Corridor project will link the San Fernando Valley to the Westside (and eventually to LAX) via a high-speed, high-capacity rail line. The rail line will provide an alternative to the 405, one of the most congested freeways in the nation. A smart Sepulveda Transit Corridor rail line would allow users to travel from the Valley to the Westside in under 20 minutes, reducing traffic and carbon emissions. Metro is considering six alternative alignment options.
